

## Well-Chosen Color Sets Fashion Chic

Volumes have been written about color . . . what it does for moods . . . how it enhances the personality . . . how it affects the emotions. All these aspects of color are most important where clothes are concerned.

The woman who is known as "chic" or a "smart dresser," either has good color and clothes sense, or she has a wise fashion advisor. One is not necessarily born with this happy faculty, but it can be cultivated.

### Find Your Colors

Choose the colors that become your type and figure, and work from there. It costs no more to buy a suit or dress in a friendly color than one which makes you either too drab or too flashy. When I say drab, the neutrals like grey, black, brown, etc., are not necessarily referred to . . . some high colors will deaden certain types of complexion.

Admittedly, it is difficult when you are very fond of a certain color or tone that is unbecoming to you. For the sake of smart appearance however, attempt to cultivate a fondness for the colors that bring out the best in you. With this year's panorama of fashionable colors, one can easily find THE color or colors that will enhance the complexion and figure of any type.

### Red Can Be Overdone

Red, a popular color with almost everyone, is being played up as never before. Entire outfits, including accessories, are

being shown in the vibrant tones. An entire outfit of red, however, eye-catching it may be on the fashion pages, may not be for you at any time. As a matter of fact, I would advise it only occasionally for anyone, as it is trying when lavishly used. However, if you like red, and it becomes your complexion but not your figure, use it only in accessories worn with deeper toned ensembles.

### Ultra-smart Unichrome

One of the smartest trends for some time is the "unichrome" idea . . . tone on tone, from head to toe. This is especially kind to the short, as the continuity and blending of color adds to the stature. For example, if gray is one of your colors, and you already have accessories or costumes in gray, try blending them with lighter or darker grays for the slight contrast needed to avoid monotony.

More suggestions in unichrome would be olive or avocado green with burnt green; grayed-browns with cedar chrome would be olive or avo-thrust blue with teal; mauve with purple; seafoam green with emerald; and, of course, black with black and white.

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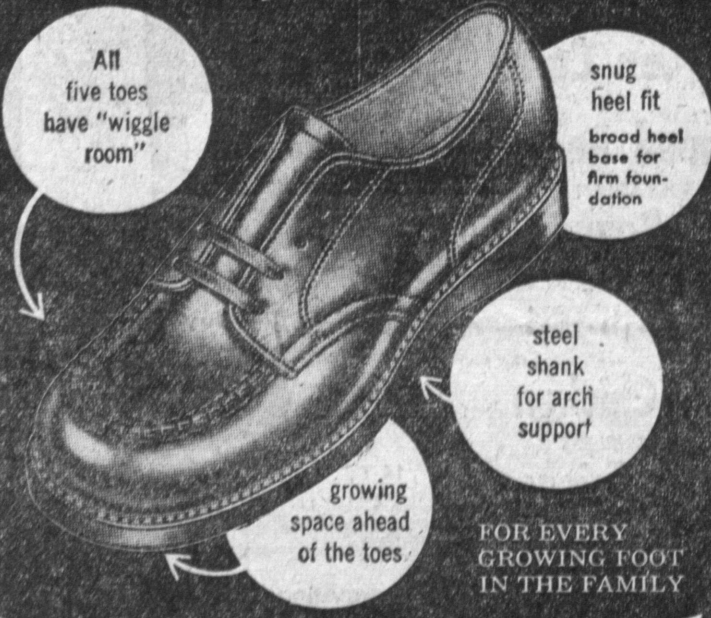
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### Nativity Mothers Elect New Officers
