While Mrs. Cornelia Groh maintained she went back East simply for a visit, hubby claims that his wife left on her own accord and that she wanted a divorce.

Thinking that she had probably obtained a divorce, Groh told Sgt. Bennett, he up and remarried, only to be faced with a rather embarrassing situation as wife No. 1 dropped in on him eight days after he said, "I Do's" with Miss Sallee.

Married 4 Years

Groh and his first wife have been married four years. They came to Torrance in January of this year.

Groh, a machinist at Torrance Douglas aircraft plant, met his second wife at the firm where they are both employed.

Mrs. Groh No. 2 is anxious to keep her troubled hubby and hopes that the matter can be straightened out. But Mrs. Groh No. 1 thinks she has some prior claims. .


