meters in the past. Tuesday night's vote found the councilmen split, 3 to 2.

Surprise Move

Councilman Albert Isen obviously surprised other members of the Council when he would not award the bids at this time to the company which had been recommended by a fact-finding committee.

Isen wanted to know why the lowest bidder (a double automatic parking meter) was not accepted and asked for a written report of the committee's findings.

Other council members maintained that the whole purpose for having turned the matter over to the fact-finding committee was to have them evaluate the meters both as to merit as well as price.

Councilman Victor Benstead, who has been an unwavering foe of the parking meters, beat other councilmen to the draw when he slipped in the first motion to reject all bids and parking meters as such.

"The people don't want them. Meters will defeat their intended purpose to help the shopping area. They're nothing but a bunch of slot machines which take all and give nothing in return," Benstead exclaimed, amid a burst of spontaneous applause by some members of the audience.

Benstead's motion died for lack of a second.

"Well, I tried," Benstead said with a resigned smile.

Motion to award the bid was made by Mayor Nick Drale and supported by Councilmen Mervin Schwab and Willys Blount.

Complete cost of installing the meters will be \$56.42 per meter.

The meters will be installed on a six months' trial basis without cost, to be accepted or rejected after that upon recommendation of the City Council.

Off-Street Parking

The need for purchasing off-street parking was also cited by George Binder in a letter to the City Council. A meeting with downtown property owners to discuss setting up an assessment district for off-street parking has been called for next Wednesday, November 3.

Binder recommended that one or two entire blocks be condemned and purchased for parking; El Prado park be converted for parking purposes; the present civic center be razed once the new one is built and the present site used for parking.

Binder claimed that large-scale measures must be taken to provide parking areas for 3000 cars in downtown Torrance if the local business district is to compete with new shopping areas rising up all around.

FLIES: North Torrance residents on 171st street near the Ormonde dairy said the fly menace is as bad as ever. The dairy will be forced to commit itself to definite days for clean-up operations and George Powell of the city will see to it that the commitment is strictly enforced.

BOND ELECTION: Official bond election totals counting the absentee ballots are as follows: Civic Center—yes, 4297; no, 881; votes cast 5178; swimming pool, yes, 3880; no, 1288; total votes cast, 5168.

NEW FIRE STATION: Bids for the new station must be in by November 23.

POLLS: Councilman Victor Benstead called for the revamping of the poll locations to make them more accessible to voters. Motion approved.

SALES TAX: License Inspector Cy Weber was ordered to continue spot checking sales tax revenues. Councilman Mervin Schwab asked for a complete report.

WALTERIA LAKE: Mayor Nick Drale appointed a committee to study reclamation of Walteria Lake for park purposes.

BUS OPERATORS: Bus drivers requested salaries compatible with those paid trash collectors and school bus operators. The matter will be studied.

HISTORICAL: A North Torrance resident asked that the old fire engine (ladder truck) be preserved for historical purposes. If the city would not do it he was willing to assume the responsibility. The matter will be studied.

GIANT TRACT: Approval of a revised tentative tract map calling for the construction of 1541 homes was granted Milton Kauffman Construction Co. The homes will be located west of Hawthorne avenue, between Torrance boulevard and Sepulveda boulevard.

TORRANCE BEACH: State, county, and city officials met to discuss the Torrance beach controversy. About 65 acres had been intended originally for park purposes. On the other hand Don Ja-Ran Construction company proposes to build on the same property. No decision was made in the matter.

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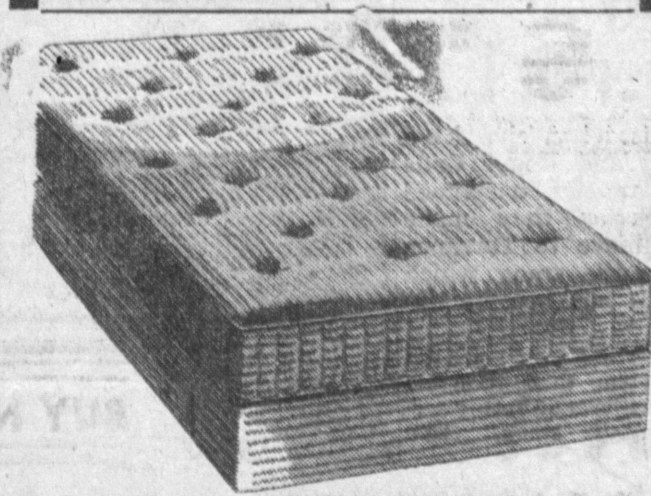
