New Opulence Seen

There is a new opulence shown in even the simplest cocktail dress... the subtle glow in the new acetates... brocades... velvet in the entire costume or merely a rich touch of trim... jeweled trims... dewey sequins, sometimes set with pearls or rhinestones... fur trims... to mention several.

For those who like sparkle and gaiety for informal entertaining we ran across an outstanding black felt swirl of a skirt at Renee's. This captivating creation was scalloped at both hemline and waist, with gala oversize sequins centered by rhinestones scattered here and there around a provocative pink felt elephant which was outlined and embellished with silver braid. The same shop offers top-mates for this skirt in scoop-necked blouses or sweaters of either black or matching pink. There was a particularly eye-catching black 'lanamere' encrusted with pearls and brilliants.

Honey-toned Unichrome

Another exciting felt skirt ensemble at Renee's featured honey-colored velveteen for the boat-necked top, the same velveteen edged with sparkly braid used as applique on the camel-toned felt circular skirt. These unichrome colors would be particularly captivating for red-heads or blondes.

Browsing through this smart little Torrance shop we found

several sheaths suitable for big or little dinners. One we found particularly electrifying was a winter white watered faille, so smart in its understated use of rich black velvet piping on the edge of a huge stiffened collar and one of the pockets. Small rhinestone clips punctuated the black velvet scroll on one side of the wide-necked collar and the pocket of the narrowly cut skirt.

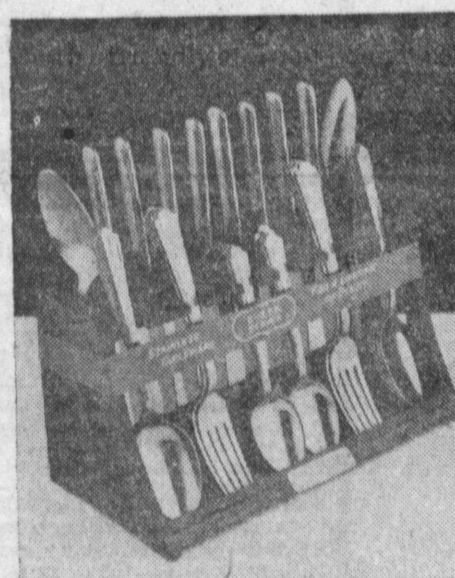
