TORRANGE MAN MAKES 'HOT' URANIUM STRIKE

An amateur Torrance uranium prospector may have hit upon the strike of his life, examination of the surface ore indicated this week. The ore has been labeled as the "hottest" strike in the Tehachapi Mountions, location of the strike.

Walt Phillips, 38, who lives at 1569 W. 228th st. with his wife and three children, stated that the Ed. Eisenhower Assay co. of Los Angeles, a "highly reputable" assaying office, found the surface samples to contain .052 per cent uranium, about half the minimum

percentage accepted by the Atomic Energy Commission.

There is a good chance that there are much stronger concentrations of uranium further down, Phillips stated.

He and a partner, owner of the land, discovered this cache and plan to blast out the rock in order to get the uranium. Phillips stated that the government pays \$3000 a ton for uranium with a minimum concentration of .10 per cent, and when the concentration is .20 per cent, the price jumps up to \$7000.

Phillips said that he and his partner might have to go down 200 feet until they find what they want. That's what was done at the recent Bakeresfield strike which netted \$30,000.

Phillips has been prospecting for uranium for a little less than a year. Prior to this he has done a little gold prospecting.

The prospector and his partner are confident that the percentage will increase as they dig deeper into the hard rock, since uranium ore loses much of its radioactivity near the surface.
