Mom, 21, To Stand Trial On Forgery

Charged with four felony counts of forgery, a 21-year-old mother will go on trial December 15 in Department C of the Long Beach Superior Court for allegedly passing more than \$800 worth of bad checks.

Mrs. Barbara Jefferson, of 2667 West Carson, was arrested here November 18 for stealing checks from her employer and then cashing them, after forging her employer's name and making the checks out to herself, according to Det. Capt. Ernie Ashton.

Mrs. Jefferson, out on \$500 bail, supposedly passed her first check for \$305 the first day she went to work for Raymond L. Toomey Building Materials company in Gardena.

The woman claims that she was heavily in debt and used the money to pay off her debts. An inquiry at various department stores where Mrs. Jefferson claimed she owed money showed that she did not make any of the payments she claimed she made, according to Capt. Ashton.

The woman apparently admits "having done the wrong thing," Ashton said. Her husband did not know of her activities.

Gifts may be brought to the Torrance Press any time.

There are many little children who have been confined to the hospital for a long time whose Christmas will be brightened by these gifts: For instance, there's little 5-year-old Gorgie, badly crippled, who hopes Santa will bring him a cowboy hat (19½" circumference); 18-month-old Eddie, badly swollen, who needs coveralls and would like to have a pulling toy; and 5-year-old Diana, seriously burned some time ago, who needs all types of clothing, average size.

Suggested Items

The children range in age from a few hours old till 13 years. Here are some gift suggestions released by the hospital:

Suggested items for girls—small dolls, paper dolls, doll furniture, costume jewelry (new), toy wrist watches, hair ribbons.

Suggested items for boys—small cars, boats, trucks and airplanes, mechanical toys, toy animals, cowboys, soldiers and so forth.

Children two years and under—rubber dolls and balls, rattles, stuffed soft toys (remove buttons and bells).

Pre-school children—Hogate type educational wooden toys, musical wind-up toys, wooden puzzles (large pieces), play stores, farms, doll dishes, cook-lin pans, large beads to string (lead-free paint).

School-age girls—dolls and clothes, doll furniture, paper dolls, games, craft kits, musical toys.
