Report Asked
City Manager Stevens was asked to give a report on the proposed city-sponsored program to the Council.

Mrs. Tillim pointed out that the small cost involved would be greatly compensated by the fact that a juvenile delinquent costs the taxpayer \$500 a year. The job-program would be a way of delinquency-prevention. In a statement to the Torrance Press, Fred Boren, of the State

of California Employment Service, 1628 Cravens avenue said that the agency also has a set-up for providing jobs for juniors at no cost.

Free Service
The problem at present is to find enough jobs to go around, Boren stated. Boren called attention to the fact that his agency may be contacted by anyone having work to be done. The agency will find someone to do the job, whether the job is

part time, full-time, or only one involving a few hours work.

There is no cost involved either in finding a job for a person or a person for a job, Boren stated. The agency may be reached by phoning FA. 8-2611.

In the meantime, various civic leaders have indicated interest in job-program for high school students.

"Trying to promote jobs for high school students sounds like a good idea," Dr. J. H. Hull, superintendent of schools,

stated. "The schools have always favored work experience for students."

"Merchants have certain problems when it comes to hiring high school students," Sam Levy, local merchant, stated. "Retail Merchants have to abide by certain Union specifications which places certain restrictions on the hiring policy." Levy, however, indicated interest in some type of feasible work program.

Paul Loranger, president of the Chamber of Commerce, also indicated that he would give the matter some thought.

Some observers hoped that industry could be brought into the picture by offering to hire a number of students on a part-time basis.

The need for a positive and constructive program before the problem of Idle Time gets out of hand was strongly emphasized by Police Sgt. D. C. Cook, of the Torrance juvenile bureau.

Suggested Items
The children range in age from a few hours old up to 13 years. Here are some gift suggestions released by the hospital:

Suggested items for girls—furniture, costume jewelry (new), toy wrist watches, hair ribbons.

Suggested items for boys—small cars, boats, trucks and airplanes, mechanical toys, toy animals, cowboys, soldiers and so forth.

Children two years and under—rubber dolls and balls, rattles, stuffed soft toys (remove buttons and bells).

Pre-school children—Holgate type educational wooden toys, musical wind-up toys, wooden puzzles (large pieces), play stores, farms, doll dishes, cooking pans, large beads to string (lead-free paint).

School-age girls—dolls and clothes, doll furniture, paper dolls, games, craft kits, musical toys.

School-age boys—building and construction toys (no sharp edges or toys requiring cutting tools), tinkering toys, trucks and cars, viewers with strips, games.

Older girls—costume jewelry, manicure sets, handkerchiefs, purses, cosmetics, cosmetic bags, scarves, kits for making sequin, felt jewelry and purses.

Older boys—harmonicas, solid wood models, wallets, toilet kits, belts, leather craft kits.
