#### TORRANCE MAY BE CUT OFF

Proposed annexation of 6800 cres in the Rolling Hills area to Torrance developed into a free-for-all this week, with Palos Verdes moving into a position which could leave Torrance out

The Rancho Palos Verdes Homeowners Protective Association, headed by George Fenn, has asked the Palos Verdes Estates City Council to annex a ract of land that would cut Torrance off from the 6800 acres offered for annexation by Great Lakes Carbon corpora-

The Palos Verdes City Council has the matter under study at present and PV officials are non-committal on the proposal

Apparently choking to death on a baby aspirin tablet administered to her by her mother was Patricia Ann Oberpriller, 16 months, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Oberpriller of 17622 Kornblum avenue.

The little girl was suffering from a severe cold, according to her mother, who gave her the pill to provide relief. The tablet lodged in the baby's throat.

Firemen were unable to revive the girl, nor was Oberprifler, who attempted to breathe into the tots' mouth to keep her breathing until firemen arrived.


