Gov't Workers May Claim Unemployment Benefits Now

Unemployed former Federal civilian employees may start filing claims for unemployment insurance under the new Federal program on January 3, it was announced today by Winona Ellis, manager of the Torrance local office of the California Department of Employment.

The state agency will act as agent of the Federal Government in administering the new program which gives former employees of the United States Government the same protection against wage loss due to unemployment that is available to workers in private industry.

"We expect this new program to get under way smoothly," Mrs. Ellis said. "Our staff has been trained in the new procedures that are necessary in handling the Federal claims and is ready to serve our new group of claimants."

From the standpoint of the claimant, filing a claim for unemployment compensation for Federal employees will differ little from filing a claim for state unemployment insurance. The person will fill out our regular application for work and claim form. He will have the same interviews that are given state claimants, and his eligibility for benefits will be decided on the basis of the California unemployment insurance code.

"If he is eligible, he will receive the same amount of benefits that state claimants receive. This amount will range from \$10 to \$30 a week, depending upon the claimant's prior earnings."

Mrs. Ellis emphasized that the Federal workers' eligibility for benefits will be tested just as accurately as is the eligibility of claimants under the state law.

COUNTY TO ZONE VICTOR TERRITORY

The Regional Planning Commission previewed proposed zoning of the County area known as "Victor Island." It is bounded on the north, east and south by the City of Torrance, and on the west by Redondo Beach.

The area is 650 acres in extent. Del Amo boulevard is the northern boundary, Hawthorne boulevard to the east, Torrance boulevard to the south, and the ridge east of Prospect avenue is the western boundary.

Oil derricks, several of which are now operating, dot the area. Torrance has been consulted regarding the proposed zoning of this district, so that both City and County zoning can be properly related.

The Regional Planning Commission approved the general proposals, and a public hearing will be scheduled.

CITY TO SERVICE ARLINGTON PLAZA

Tired of the Moneta Water company's double talk, the City Council voted unanimously to have the city take over the water service for Arlington Plaza till now served by Moneta.

This action followed because the City Council was finally fed up with trying to deal with Moneta Water company directly. Despite the fact that Moneta had publicly gone on record before the Council agreeing to the transfer, the company continued to use all sorts of maneuvers to prevent the transfer, finally making a complete about-face, councilmen claimed.

Several months ago, a homeowners' petition signed by 48 of the 60 homeowners was submitted to the Council requesting Torrance rather than Moneta water service.

The Moneta company, represented by Attorney John McCall, readily consented to the transfer only asking that a "hold harmless" phrase be included in the contract.

These requests were complied with by the City of Torrance according to City Attorney James Hall, but Moneta still refused to go through with the deal.

This week the city received a letter from Attorney McCall which appeared like a complete about-face on the part of Moneta Water company from what was originally agreed to.

McCall charged that as "we understand now" the majority of the people in the tract do not want the change and that Moneta Water company never asked the Torrance Water department "to take over."

McCall claimed that the residents have demanded that Moneta "continue to furnish them water" and that Moneta is "willing, ready, and able" to do so and has already proceeded to do this.

If the city of Torrance proceeds to cut off Moneta's water service "before there is satisfaction," McCall threatened.
