

Rescue Praised Operation

A mock search and rescue operation Saturday in the rugged Rolling Hills area testing the efficiency of Explorer Post 726X received high praise of Sheriff William A. Kennard, of the Lennox sheriff's office, who watched the operation in an advisory capacity. Purpose of the hour-long search, in which 14 boys participated was to train the local unit in rescue operations. The boys used a skirmish line to

comb the valley for an "injured" man who had to be given first aid on the spot and then carried up a steep incline on an improvised stretcher. The group, under the leadership of R. F. Evans, will continue training in rescue work and will be used as an exhibition and training group for other explorer posts, it was stated.

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
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Still No Job For Father Of Twins

OPENS NEW GP REFINERY

A. E. Thompson, manager of the Torrance General Petroleum refinery, has received word from C. G. Cortelyou that the Ferndale (Wash.) Mobilgas refinery is officially "on steam."

Cortelyou, formerly located at Torrance as chief design engineer, is now manager of the Ferndale plant.

Located on an 850-acre Puget Sound site near Bellingham, construction of the 350,000-barrel per day refinery took nearly 18 months to complete. Bechtel corporation was the contractor for the project.

Principal products of the refinery are gasoline, fuel oils, distillates and liquefied petroleum gases.

Sixty-three former Torrance employees have transferred to Ferndale to help staff the new \$40,000,000 plant.

County Territory

Areas in the county of Los Angeles, like the sump into which the little dog fell, are governed by the Kathy Fiscus ordinance which calls for a fence around all sumps.

According to officials from the County Engineering Department, Lennox Sheriff's station is responsible for enforcing the ordinance and citing violators.

The City Council of Los Angeles is presently drafting an amendment to its present law contained in the Fire Prevention Code which will tighten the provisions covering oil derricks and oil sumps.

"We expect the Los Angeles law to be a model law," George Powell, land use investigator for Torrance said. "We're all trying to adopt a uniform ordinance."
