



Cutter Vaccine Being Probed

All polio vaccinations were stopped in Torrance as of yesterday, according to Dr. Benjamin Kogan, district health officer for the L. A. County Health Department.

This order was issued for all of Los Angeles because six cases of polio have broken out among children innoculated with the vaccine.

None of these cases occurred locally, however.

It is possible that these children incurred polio before receiving the shots. However, the government is not taking any chances and will investigate the matter first.

A total of 4599 youngsters in the Torrance area have already received their first polio shots, Dr. Kogan stated.


Another 5041 children were to be given vaccinations next week. These shots have been cancelled.
