# 4th Dog YOUNG MOTHER OF 5 Rabies

A Boston bulldog, the fourth dog within four weeks, died Friday of rabies, Dr. Ben Kogan, district health officer of the Los Areales Create Market. the Los Angeles County Health Department revealed this week.

The 7-year-old black and white dog was owned by Wayne Gow of 4201 West 165th street,

Cause of contact could not be determined. The dog lived within the same general area as the previous three North Torrance dogs which died of

The dog was observed to be ill May 2 and refused to eat or drink as of that date. It began to cough May 3 and was taken VOL. VII hay. Impounded at the Yukon animal shelter May 5, it died the following day.

No human or animal contacts have been reported so far. The dog displayed typical symptoms of dumb rabies: dilated eyes; dropping jaw; weak rear legs and loss of appetite, Dr. Kogan

At present 18 Torrance residents are undergoing Pasteur treatment as a result of actual or suspected contacts with three previous dogs which died of

A request made by two local residents for a compulsory rables vaccination law for dogs was "filed" by the City Council Tuesday night.

A letter requesting such a law was submitted to the Council by W. Neil and Frances Kanawyer of 4323 West 176th street.

The Kanawyer request, made in the light of the recent outbreak of rabies in the city of Police Officers Torrance, read as follows in

"We don't believe it's true that the City Council ignores the rabies issue as far as compulsory vaccination law against rabies for dogs is concerned," the letter stated.


