



#### TWO VAQUEROS, TWO STAKES AND A REATA!

The first official "survey" to determine the boundaries of Rancho Palos Verdes was conducted with the characteristic and picturesque abandon typical of early California.

Two mounted vaqueros, with a 100-vara reata\* tied between two stakes, were the "surveyors." While one held his stake to the ground, the other rode the distance of the line and fixed his stake. Then his partner, in turn, galloped the next length. In this way the two could run mile after mile of boundary in a day. They marked corners of the rancho with such handy (and temporary) objects as cattle bones, rocks or a nearby clump of trees.

Today Rancho Palos Verdes is being surveyed again to mark the boundaries of many new homesites. But the horse-back vaqueros and their reata are gone, replaced by modern surveyors with transit, rod and target, leadline and chain. Thus, historic Rancho Palos Verdes enters a new era, its sun-swept rolling hills bringing new contentment and security to the many Californians who will make their homes in this most favored land.


