"The primary purpose of our conventions is to provide our ministers with advance and practical training in Bible education," it was announced by George Kezar of Torrance, presiding minister of Jehovah's Witnesses and appointed representative of the Watch Tower Bible and Tract Society, Brooklyn, New York, sponsors of the conventions.

Arrangements are already under way to send over 4000 delegates from the United States and Canada to the European assemblies. Edwin J. Kezar is numbered among the delegates to attend from Torrance.
