### Junior Achievement Group Shuts Down For Summer

Jaycorp, local Junior Achievement corporation formed by high school students in the area, has officially closed its doors and gone out of business.

No major financial reverses forced the young organization to shut down. It was just the close of school for the summer. The corporation ran under the sponsorship of the Southern California Gas Company here, was just set up to do business during the school year.

The annual report issued by the group showed that investors not only got their money back, but received a 10% dividend, according to Jaycorp President F. W. Zangger.

Treasurer Margie Simmons explained that all assets were liquidated when

the firm halted operation. Jennis Kessler, sales manager for the firm, was awarded the Junior Executive award for his successful program and his staff was given a bonus in recognition of their work in making such a profitable record for the company.

**Non-Profit**  
Junior Achievement is a national non-profit education plan that puts young people into business for themselves. Jaycorp Company was organized to produce personalized tie clasps.

Boys and girls from various high schools in Hawthorne, Inglewood, El Segundo, and Gardena were officers in the company. In addition to the president, treasurer, and sales manager, other officers were Mickey Williams, secretary; W. H. Hall, vice-president; and J. W. Parcels, production manager.

Gas Company people actively engaged in the project as advisors were H. H. Pottle, C. H. Ray, and C. E. Gray.

The young group last fall went into business by selling 226 shares of stock with a par value of \$.50 per share. A bank account was opened and at the next weekly meeting production got underway.

Clasps, kerosene lamps, blow pipes, and other supplies were utilized in the production and all members engaged in the various processes of manufacturing and selling the personalized tie clasps. In six months of operation, Jaycorp had only one complaint — through no fault of the manufacturer — and many compliments.

President Zangger summed up the year's activity in his annual report: "We the Achievers are indeed proud of our Company's program, not because we have made a profit, but because we have learned what it means to own, manage

#### Sand And Gravel Controversy

In spite of the rumors that the Pacific Hills Home Owners association executive board were not working in the best interests of the members of their association, they want the people to know that the committee appointed by the board of directors, met with the officials of the Torrance Sand and Gravel company and came to the following agreement:

May 4th, 1955  
To the Pacific Hills Home Owners association:

We, Mr. Thomas H. Block and Mr. Charles W. Shepard, co-owners of Torrance Sand and Gravel company, do hereby agree to do the following for the Pacific Hills Home Owners association if the variance for the cement mix operation is granted.

1. Paint hopper any color acceptable to the home owners of the area.
2. Plant large trees in sufficient numbers to screen the hoppers. This work to be started within 30 days after the variance is granted and completed within three months.
3. We also agree to continue planting trees and ice plants along the dike as it is completed.
4. If in the future any additional hoppers are added to our operation, they will be placed behind the hill or far enough inside our property so as not to be in direct view of the residents.

The Torrance Sand and Gravel company has been guaranteed by the manufacturer of our plant that it is a dust free operation.

The Torrance Sand and Gravel company has also taken additional precautions by completely enclosing the plant to further control any possible dust.

If in the future any home owner claims that cement has been damaging his property, the Torrance Sand and Gravel company will on conclusive proof, gladly reimburse the home owner for any damages done.

The Torrance Sand and Gravel company sincerely wishes to be a good neighbor and to have good public relations with all residents of our community.

Also, the Torrance Sand and Gravel company will gladly meet with the Pacific Hills Home Owners association at any time to correct any further problems that may arise in the future.
