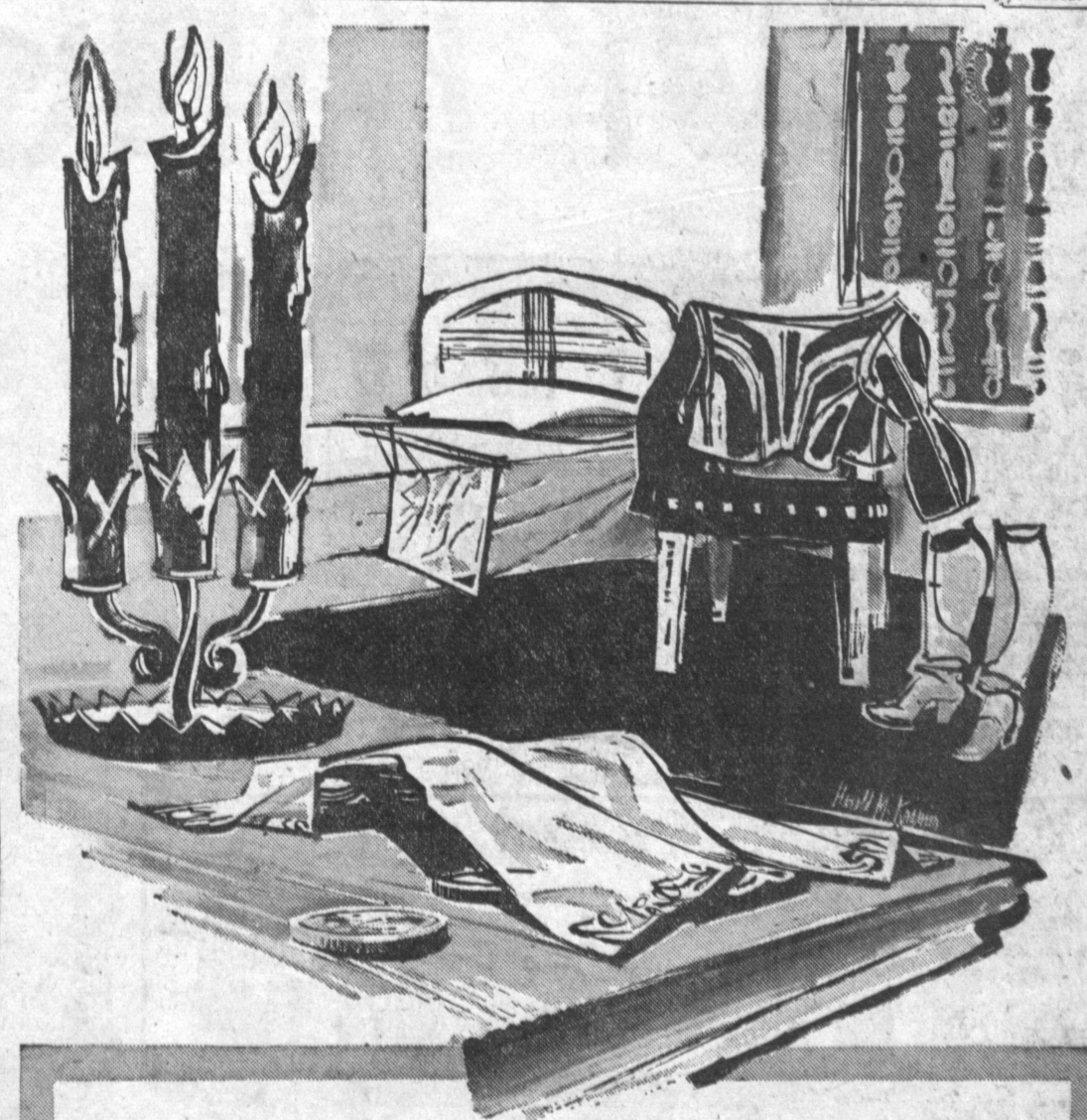

Mrs. Taylor has been active in church and civic affairs through the years. She helped to organize Amity Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and was its first Worthy Matron.

During World War I she was a leader in the work of the Red Cross. For four terms, she acted as president of the Women's Association of the First Methodist Church in Amity.

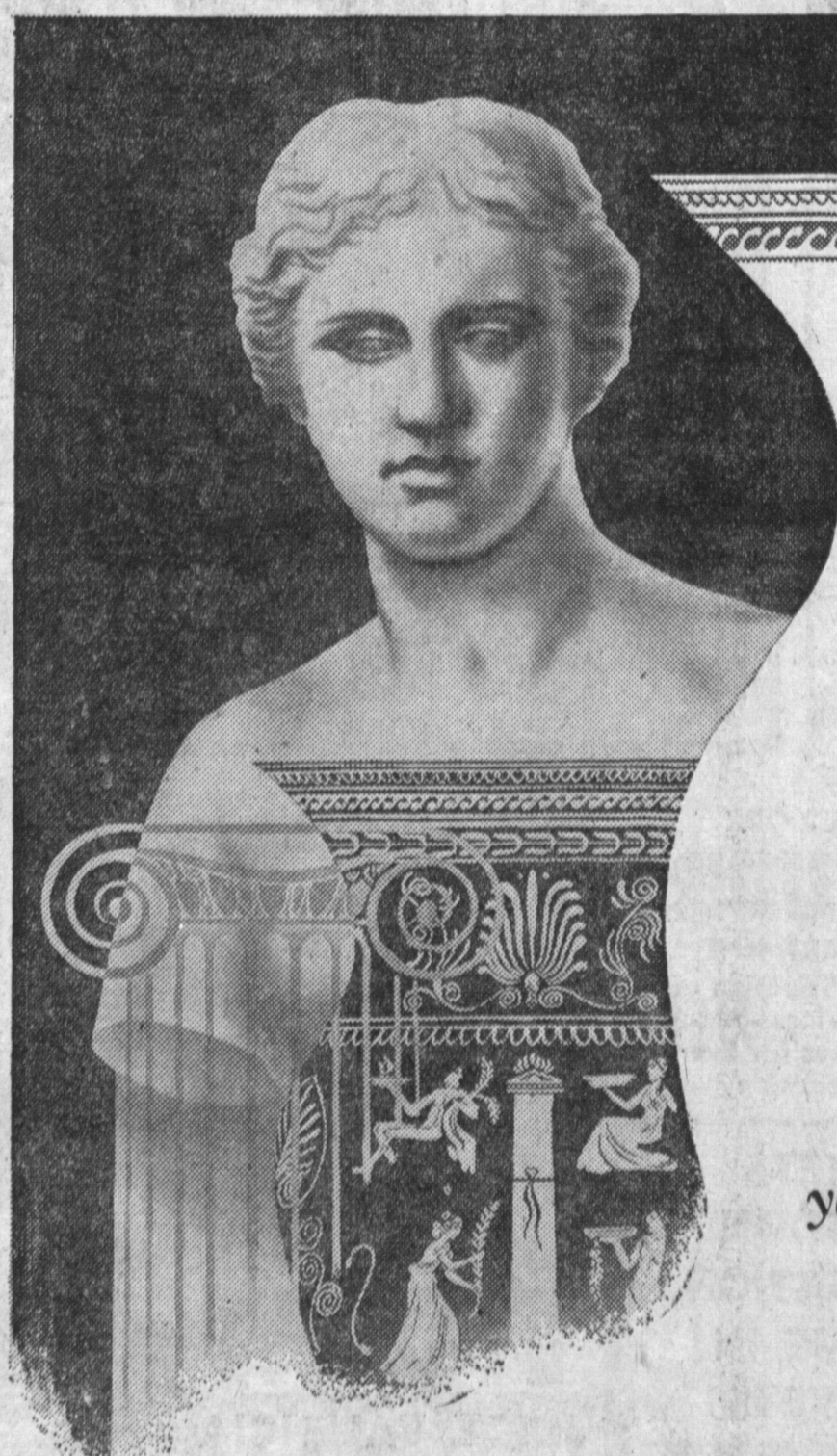
