### **Publishers Expand Newspaper Chain**

The Southland Publishing Co., Inc., publishers of the Torrance Press, this week announced the acquisition of a group of four community weeklies in the El Cajon Valley area of San Diego. The purchase includes a main office and printing plant at El Cajon and branch offices at Lakeside and La Mesa.

#### Largest Circulation

Southland Publishing Co., Inc., currently publishes the Linda Vista Press and the Claremont Press in San Diego. The new group will include six weekly newspapers serving nine San Diego communities, and will have the largest community circulation in the entire Valley.

In addition to publishing, printing and distributing the six newspapers, the El Cajon plant will offer complete job print service to the area, officials of the firm disclosed. **Assumes Duties**




