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

COUNCIL CHAMBER FILLED TO CAPACITY

An overwhelming majority of Torrance residents went on record in writing and in person as favoring a compulsory anti-rabies vaccination law for dogs, it was revealed at a public hearing before the City Council Tuesday night.

A count of petitions, individual letters, Torrance Press coupons, and actual individuals attending the meet-Results! ing indicated more than 650 in favor of the measure as against about 25 opposed to it.

Abiding by strictly formal rules of debate, Mayor Albert Isen and members of the Council permitted 9 indi-viduals to speak in favor of the ordinance; 11 to speak The phone cans multiplied like rabbits, and, incidentally, that's what they were about!
