

2 Burglaries In Lomita

Two cat burglaries, netting over \$300 in goods, and apparently committed by the same unknown person, occurred in Lomita last week-end.

Small appliances valued at \$208 were removed from the home of Abbie B. MacHale, 25353 Eshelman st., sometime Saturday evening. The burglar entered the residence through an unlocked rear window, according to Lennox sheriff's deputies. A radio, two clocks, a steam iron and a leather jewelry case were among the loot.

The second theft, also occurring Saturday night, resulted in the loss of a camera and a pair of slacks from the home of Falciano Q. Olvera, 54, of 2240 W. 250th st. The burglar gained entrance by cutting the screen on the back door.

In both cases, burned matches were found scattered throughout the house. The sheriff's office indicated that as yet no suspects have been apprehended for the crimes.

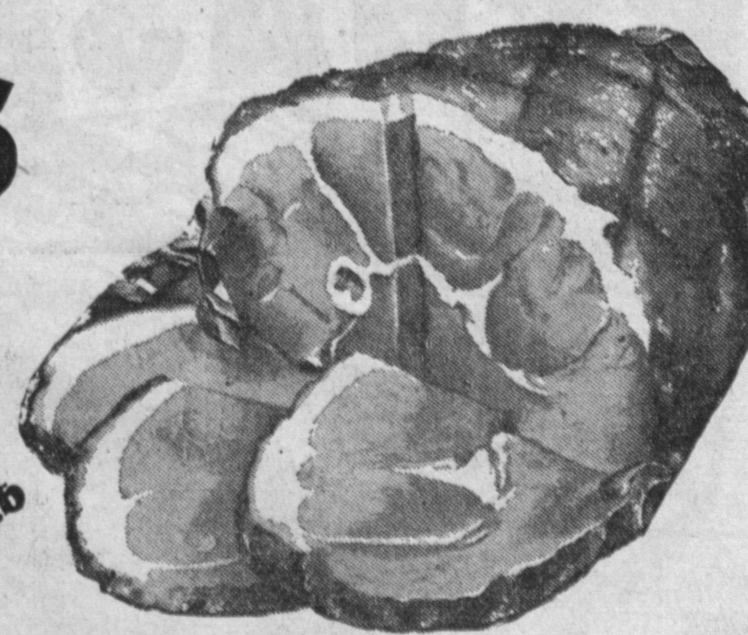
