3 South Bay Cities Pass Rabies Law

As of this week, Torrance is the only city in the South Bay area which does not have a rabies law. And, as of NO. 21 this week, a Torrance citizens' committee has gone into high gear circulating petitions asking the Torrance City Council to reconsider its stand and pass the rabies

These petitions will be presented to the City Council shortly, spokesmen for the group announced.'

The group, known as the Committee for the Control of Rabies, organized when the Torrance City Council defeated the rables law several weeks ago by a vote of 3-2.

Anxious To Sign

"We've had no difficulty getting signatures. People are anxious to sign," Mrs. Ruth Vaughan stated.

Since Torrance first considered the rabies law and turned it down, Manhattan Beach, Hermosa Beach and now Redondo Beach have passed such a law. Redondo was the latest city

to join the security chain against rabies, when a Redondo councilman who originally voted against the law switched his vote Monday night and voted In Torrance, Councilmen Mer-
