self on the inside looking out again. Irving Lester Arnold, 50, of Lumerton, Mississipi, was held for Culver City police on suspicion of grand theft auto as a result of the alertness of Policewomen Regina Ryan and Maxine Herman, according to Torrance detectives.

Arnold tried to purchase a .38 calibre pistol at the Torrance Loan and Jewelry co., 1342 El Prado last week. Before the sale could be made, clearance had to be obtained from Torrance police.

A check with Criminal Inves tigation and Identification bureau showed that a man with Arnold's name had been convicted of three crimes and served time for them and tha he was now wanted on sus picion of grand theft.

When Arnold returned to the store Friday to find out if he could take the gun with him, the proprietor checked once more with Torrance police to

·1400 Residents Petition Council for Rabies Law

Petitions carrying 1457 signatures in favor of a received nearly as many as 1457 signatures. rabies law were submitted to the City Council Tuesday night in an effort to get the council to reconsider its stand on the rabies issue and enact a rabies law.

Circulating the petitions were members of the Committee for the Control of Rabies who were aided by numerous P-TA members and groups.

No action was taken by the council following the presentation of petitions nor was there any discussion of the matter. While petitioners were obviously stunned by the complete lack of response, they were hoping the councilmen would give serious thought to their impressive request.

Petitions Will Continue In the meantime the individuals indicated that they would continue circulating petitions and that they would return from week to week as more names poured in.

Petitions were accompanied by a few comments made by a number of individuals.

Mrs. Herma Tillim, of 16940 Osage st., in addressing Councilman Nick Drale, argued that there was nothing wrong with a "compulsory" law.
