"I didn't realize that there are so many nice peo ole in the world," Mrs. Robert Grout, 20, of 4715 Milne dr., Torrance, exclaimed gratefully this week, as help for her and her two children flocked in from every quarter.

As on other occasions, local residents displayed their generosity and opened their hearts again to someone in need after they read of Mrs. Grout's plight in the Torrance Press last week

Mrs. Grout, her husband, Bob, and their two children, had just come to Torrance two months ago from Des Moines. Iowa. But the 22-year-old husband was stricken with bulbar polio shortly after, which left the family completely helpless.

People brought enough food to last Mrs. Grout and her children until her husband is released from Rancho Los Amigos; her washing and ironing needs were more than answered when she received two washing machines and two ironing boards; people brought enough clothing for the children so that Mrs. Grout will not have to worry on that score for a long time; there was a high-chair and tricycle also, and she received a total of \$70 in cash.

Car To Be Repaired

Since publication of last week's story, the transmission of Mrs. Grout's '49 Kaiser went out.

When the Civitan club, a local service organization heard

of this, the members decided to assume responsibility for repairing the car so that Mrs. Grout and her children could continue their visits to the hospital.

Floyd and Russ's garage, at Paramount Builders, 3401. Torrance blvd., offered to cooperate, according to Carl Duncan and Tom Ward of the Civitan club.

"When we read about Mrs. Grout." Duncan stated, "We were reminded of the Civitan creed and we wanted to live up to it."
