## Wife, Child Splattered With Acid, Father Held

In a fit of anger while visiting his wife and baby, an estranged husband threw a bottle of sulphuric acid at his wife and 21-months-old daughter, fled the house, and then walked into the police station to give himself

Booked on a charge of assault with a caustic chemical Thursday afternoon at the Torrance Police Station was Edwin J. Hendricks, 28, who has been living in a Lomita hotel since separating from his wife.

Rushed to Harbor General Hospital were Mrs. Patsy J. Hendricks, 23, and her daughter, Pamela, according to detectives. The women called police following the episode. The two escaped serious burns and were released following treatment.

Mrs. Hendricks refused to prosecute and Hendricks was fined \$50.00 on a malicious mischief charge. He was ordered to see a psychiatrist. The fine was paid by his wife, according to detectives.

Mrs. Hendricks told detectives that her husband came to the house and asked for a cup of coffee. Following her to the bedroom after asking to see a coat which he had recently bought for her, he pulled a paper sack from his own coat and began sprinkling acid from a container within the sack on his wife's coat.

Mrs. Hendricks was hit by acid on the face, shoulders, and legs and the little girl burned on the feet in the ensuing struggle, according to police.

## **Torrance** Called 'Disgrace'

Aroused over the dirtiness of Torrance roads and streets, members of the City Council called for an all-out crack down on dumpers and litterbugs through the assistance of every individual and agency in the community.

The long-smouldering sore spot came to a head Tuesday night when Councilman Mervin Schwab, commenting on his recent vacation trip, declared:

"In 6000 miles of traveling I did not see any streets which are as dirty as those in Torrance. It's a disgrace."

Schwab's comment and call for action precipitated wholehearted agreement and support on the part of the other council members.

3-Fold Attack The council called for the fol-

lowing multi-pronged attack on the problem: 1. Firm, hard-hitting enforcement of fines against violators

by judges of the South Bay Municipal Court. Fines are now \$25. Other states impose as heavy a fine as \$100. 2. An all-out drive against

violators by police officers.

3. Getting every resident of the community to report violations and the violator's name or license number to police. (FA. 8-

"Let's make some arrests and have the courts enforce the law," Mayor Isen declared.

"We have to have everyone's help," City Manager George Stevens declared. "If people start reporting these cases and we start making arrests in numbers and get the cooperation of the judges we will solve the problem."

He pointed out that New

"In a previous campaign here we made 8-13 arrests quickly and then took our cases to court but had little luck there." the city manager complained. "They (the judges) have to cooperate, too. They accept excuses too easily."

The South Bay Municipal Court came in for further criticism in prosecuting these cases when Police Chief William Haslam declared:

"It's fine to ask for a \$100 fine—if we could get a \$2 fine there we'd be lucky."

Individuals submitted reports from their various organizations and participated in group discussions in anticipation of a community-wide old-fashioned townmeeting to be held some time in February, as part of a State-wide program initiated by Governor Goodwin Knight.

Following a briefing by Rev. Nathan Bond of the First Baptist church and committee charman, members were split into three discussion groups as follows:

1) Evaluation of existing juvenile problems in the local Torrance area (Sgt. D. C. Cook, chairman); 2) Description and evaluation of whatever facilities and pro-

grams individuals and groups are offering to meet the problem (Dr. Kurt Shery, chairman);

3) Suggestions for improving methods of dealing with juvenile problems (Mrs. G. F. Billingsley, chairman). EXISTING JUVENILE PROBLEMS

Lack of parental supervision was one of the major reasons cited for existing juvenile problems.

"A juvenile delinquent is a boy whose parents care nothing about him," one spokesman said. While juvenile delinquency can frequently be traced to the home environment, it was pointed out that "reaching the parents"
