PROPOSAL MAY GO TO VOTERS

An explosive element which might soon burst into a major controversial issue was introduced at Tuesday night's City Council meeting when the proposal was made to combine City Council and School Board elections. They have been kept independent of each other in the past.

The proposal was made by Councilman Victor Benstead and "informally" approved by the other council members. Benstead introduced the proposal as part of other charter amendments presently being considered by the council. proposed amendments would be placed before the voters in

General dissatisfaction with the way School Board elections have been handled was expressed by the council. The basic argument was that only a few hundred people now elect the School Board whose members are supposed to represent

Employees Locked in Refrigerator

One week following the \$4500 robbery of a grocery store during which one shot was fired and three men locked in an ice box, a 19-yearold Torrance youth and a companion were arrested on suspicion of robbery and possible kidnaping.

Admitting the robbery of Von's market in Gardena were Rocco James Pallumbo, 19, of 22111 South Halldale, Torrance, and Leslie Roy Butts, 27, of Huntington Park, according to Capt. Roy Tracey of the Gardena police department.

Only \$698 of the \$4500 were recovered. The men said they spent the money on clothes and doing a lot of things they wanted to do," Tracey stated.
