## ZAMPERINI TELLS OF JOURNEY FROM DELINQUENCY TO SALVATION

of Lou Zamperini's speech before the Torrance Lions club Tuesday when he told dramatically about his life as a juvenile delinquent; world athlete; survivor of 47 days on a life raft and 21/2 years in a Japanese prison camp; worldly and material success; failure; conversion and evangelism.

Zamperini, who was born and raised in Torrance, graduatng from Torrance high school, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Zamperini of 2721 Sonoma ave.

A book of his, "The Devil at My Heels," will be published next month.

Touching upon his life as a juvenile delinquent, Zamperini recalled the time when he returned victorious from the Olympic games in 1936 having set a world record of the mile run in Berlin. 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


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
