Fifty years of faith and love were celebrated on the Golden anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Charles M. Wyne, 2027 West 240th street, Lomita.

Mrs. Chris Sorenson of 1631 Madrid and Mrs. Joe Kruger of 912 Beech avenue, daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Wyne, held a surprise party for their parents on Saturday, March 3 in honor of their wedding date fifty years ago, on March 3, 1906, in Mt. Vernon, Indiana.

Mr. and Mrs. Wyne came to Torrance in 1918 and lived here until 1947 when they bought property and moved to Lomita. "We have seen Torrance grow from the time when the downtown area was almost no more than a block around," Mrs. Wyne said.

"We love our home here, but sometimes I miss having the chance to watch Torrance as it continues growing," she said. "However, we feel very close because our back fence is the dividing line between Torrance and Lomita."

When the family first came here, Wyne worked at the Union Tool Co., now the National Supply Co. After five and a half years with that firm, he became a plastering contractor and continued in that line until he retired in 1947.

The Wynes have a son, James W. Wyne of Joshua Tree, California, and a grandson, Carl, who is seven years old.

When the daughters told Mrs. Wyne that neighbors and friends would be dropping in soon to celebrate the anniversary, Mrs. Wyne said she jumped up and immediately started worrying because she had not washed the windows.

"That's exactly why we didn't let you know about the party ahead of time," Mrs. Sorenson told her.

Around 35 neighbors and friends came to honor the couple and discuss old times.

One of the topics which came up in reviewing memories of their family through the years was the fact that Mrs. Chris Sorenson was chosen to represent Torrance's native daughter in a photographic survey of the city compiled by the Chamber of Commerce.

Mrs. Sorenson was completely unimpressed by the high honor. This was not necessarily due to a sense of modesty, but rather due to the fact that she was only one year old when this fame came to her.
