We asked the candidates to answer 3 questions to enable local voters to form a more concrete opinion of the individuals seeking public office. The three questions were:

1. Despite a streamlined oil field law passed by the present council, proper oil derrick provisions were sidestepped. Do you intend to propose stricter legislation which will permit the removal of hazardous, derricks which, for all practical purposes, 2. The need for off-street parking is a serious problem in

Forrance. However, Torrance still does not have a law requiring individuals or firms planning to construct new commercial enterprises to provide proper off-street parking sites. Do you intend to introduce such legislation? 3. A suggestion has been made to propose a \$1,000,000

ound issue to the voters for purposes of providing additional off-street parking sites in Torrance. Do you favor placing that issue before the voters? Of the 15 candidates only three candidates showed the cour-

Mayor of the Town

There seem to be many new residents of Torrance the local mayor is chosen and how that influences elections, such as the one about to occur April 10.

The strange alliances and the ambitious bid for power made by various political factions result to a large degree from the knowledge that they who control the council control the mayorship.

The mayor of Torrance is not elected by the people at large. The voters only elect the councilmen and the councilmen then choose a mayor from among themselves

There are five men on the council and it therefore takes three of them to agree on a mayor.

The mayor, as a rule, serves a two-year period, after which he may be re-elected if the council so wishes. The two-year period is not fixed, however, since both Nick Drale and Albert Isen served one year apiece.

Of those now on the council, Mervin Schwab served as mayor two years; Nick Drale, one year; and Albert Isen is now serving out his first year. Councilman Benstead has refused the mayorship repeatedly and is expected to do so again if reelected to the council. Councilman Willys Blount never has been mayor.

The council's policy in the past has been to rotate the mayorhip. It is not bound to that policy, however.

Those seeking reelection to the council are Benstead and kory sts. in downtown Torrance Drale. Schwab is not running again.

The election seems to be developing into a struggle for control of the mayorship, with the Blount-Drale-Smith-Garrabrant faction on the one hand and the Isen-Benstead-Jahn-King faction on the other.

What will happen nobody knows. But every vote cast will have a direct bearing on who shall be elected as Torrance's next

Court Upholds Cecil Smith, James Dresser

A two-year legal fight with the city for reinstatement was won this week by former building superintendent, James Dresser, and his No. 49 assistant, Cecil Smith (since deceased) when the District Court of Appeals ruled Tuesday in favor of the two men.

The court indicated that the Torrance City Council was not acting within its jurisdiction when it reversed the Civil Service Commission's decision two years ago and fired the two

The commission only recommended that Dresser be suspended without pay for 75 days and Smith be suspended without pay for 60 days, after which they were to be restored to their

Dresser and Smith were represented by attorneys John E. McCall and James C. R. McCall.

The decision, handed down by Division 2 of the District Court of Appeals, will not become final for 60 days. If the city will not appeal the decision to the Supreme Court of California within that time, a hearing will be held on damages.

Damages would consist of back pay from the time of discharge until the time of reinstatement minus earnings made in the same occupation since that time.

In the case of Dresser, pay vould be retroactive to May 25, 1954. In the case of Smith, it would go back to May 10 up to the time of his death, February 8, 1956. His wife, Mrs. Minnie Smith, was substituted in the suit since Smith's death.

About 12 charges involving ailure to enforce city building ordinances and not keeping ecords were lodged with the Civil Service Board against the two men two years ago.

The Board found the men inocent of the charges but maintained that they were not as thoroughly familiar with their work as they might have been.

The court found that the City Council did not have the right one hand, and the Isen-Benstead Board's decision in this case, stating that the board's findings were final and conclusive, They were grimly engaged according to James C. R. Mc-
