

James Hall maintains, is that the court rested its decision on another Supreme Court ruling (Peters vs. Hobby) which does not apply in this case.

According to that case, the body involved had the power to reduce or eliminate the punishment but not to increase it.

However, Hall said, that body did not have legal powers whereas the City Council has been given legal powers by the city charter.

The other error involves the court's concept that the city manager was the head of the building department and not Dresser

"We intend to show what the charter shows - namely, what his duties consist of and the fact that he is in a managerial posi-tion over all the heads of the

departments," Hall said.
Hall said that the petition for rehearing will be filed shortly. If it is denied, the city will know in about 30 days whether the State Supreme Court will hear the case or not. It will then take about four months to obtain a decision.

### I HAVE SOME MORE TO SAY ABOUT REAL ESTATE



It is technically legal and advisable for a council, man to decline to vote on an issue in which he has a personal and/or financial interest. HOWEVER, SUCH A REALTOR - COUNCILMAN WHO MUST DO THIS ON NUMEROUS OCCASIONS—AS HAS BEEN DEMON-STRATED BY ONE MEMBER OF THE PRESENT CITY COUNCIL—IS ABSOLUTELY NOT FULFILLING HIS MORAL OBLIGATIONS TO THE VOTERS OF TOR-RANCE ... NOR IS HE ENHANCING THE GOOD NAME OF THE REAL ESTATE PROFESSION.

One councilman, for example, just last week declined to vote on two tract maps involving 97 Torrance residential lots . . . because, in his own words, "I have a financial interest in this." When a councilman consistently declines to vote "for" or "against" important issues, he is depriving every man, woman, and child in Torrance of the representation to which they are entitled by law.
