

ments for each trip. Permits are obtained from the city of Los Angeles and the city of Inglewood. Both city and county fire departments also are alerted along the route.

At the time of departure, Transportation and Plant Protection provide four escort cars, with revolving red lights, to drive ahead and behind the trailer. An inspector from the Los Angeles Moving Office also joins the convoy. To provide maximum safety for the valuable load, the cars are constantly in touch with the truck driver by radio.

Enroute to the airport, State Police and Los Angeles Police cars cruise ahead of the convoy to alert late driving motorists. Because of the unique design of the trailer, which permits the airplane to roll on and off the bed, no lifting equipment is needed.
