"We want the best, and if it hasn't come along, we invent it," said John Melville, manager of the Creamery.

Melville, himself, has a number of inventions to his credit, including the "Two-Toter," a plastic handle for carrying two cartons of milk at a time; a test bettle-shaker; and a vaccuum-ize which takes the air out of milk and preserves the vitamin C content.




