A Torrance motorcycle officer struck the ground head-first with an estimated 5-ton impact Sunday when his motorcycle went out of control at around 50 m.p.h.

Credited with saving his life was a thick, solid crash helmet which absorbed the shock and scrapes. The crash helmet was slightly cracked following the crash and the side which had scraped along the ground was

Miraculously emerging with only minor scrapes and bruises was Officer A. L. Jackson who was chasing a motorcycle speeder when the accident happened at Del Amo and Henrietta. Jackson said that at times he was going 90 m.p.h. during the one-

half mile chase.

Hits Dirt He was going about 50 m.p.h. when he suddenly saw that he was approaching the end of the paved street. He said he went about 158 ft. with his brakes on when the cycle hit the dirt road and flopped over.

"I jumped off and landed head-first on the road," Jackson recalled. "Then the rest of my body hit the road. The bike slid about 56 feet and I found myself 10 feet from the motorcycle when I stopped moving."

Jackson said that the helmet company estimated that his head hit the ground with a 5-ton impact.

No Headache

"It cracked the helmet and scraped it—but I didn't even have a headache," Jackson marveled. "If I hadn't been wearing that helmet I would have been dead. I know for sure now that I won't ride a motorcycle for even five minutes without wearing a crash helmet. I'm all for safety!"

Jackson got dirt in his mouth, nose, and ears in the fall. He thinks that the visor on the helmet kept his glasses from breaking. He was still wearing them. Jackson phoned the accident in himself by means of his police radio.

Aithough walking around, he will be off work for about four days. The speeder, whom he was chasing, got away.

Jackson was involved in another major accident in July, 1954. While writing a ticket near Crenshaw and Dominguez, a passing car struck him and carried him 57 feet on its hood.

Jackson suffered a broken leg and fractured skull. He was unconscious 18 hours and had to stay in the hospital 23 days. He was laid off work for 10 months.

This, however, is not true. The only time all voters are otified is when the ballot calls for a consideration of financial

We believe that there should be as many precincts during a school election as during a municipal election and that every registered voter is notified of the time, place, and issues.
