made for the Junior's participation inspired by Mrs. Allen, in First Aid courses, distribution of Civil Defense literature, working with George Powell, assistant Civil Defense director in Torrance, and setting up a program whereby the Woman's Club house would be used as an emergency hospital staffed by Junior emergency workers.

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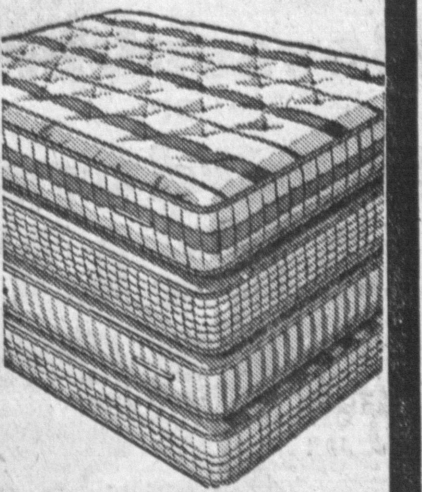
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Joanne Underdown Weds Duane Carter
