It's Time To Make Plans For Rabies Clinics Here

It will be time soon to take out dog licenses and have The possibility that city taxes dogs vaccinated against rabies, if they have not already

Starting July 1, dog licenses will be issued. This will be the first time, too, that dogs must be vaccinated or that certificates of vaccination must be shown in accord-Mayor Albert Isen suggested ance with a law passed in Torrance and in the county of Los Angeles since last summer.

We believe that the Torrance City Council, the California Veterinary association, local veterinarians and pound officials should take steps now to set up clinics for

Ample and convenient provisions should be made to offer the vaccination service during the first four weeks of the licensing period as called for in the ordinance.

Every effort should be made to make these shots City Manager George Stevens available for \$1.50 which seems to be the standard rate charged by clinics throughout the county.
