The City Council's first move in what may eventually result in the development of a huge central shopping area smack in the middle of Torrance was made Tuesday night when the council approved a variance to permit a commercial center at Sepulveda and Hawthorne.

The variance, requested by the Del Amo Estates co., includes the area bounded by Sepulveda, Madrona, Carson (extension) and Hawthorne.

No plans were revealed at this time as to the type of development planned for this

The council's action confirms an earlier

story and map published by the Torrance Press indicating that this area may be used for development of a shopping center.

Possibility of rezoning the rest of the area up to Torrance blvd. (between Hawthorne and Madrona) for commercial purposes, except for the CCMO property, has also been studied by the Planning Commis-

Should that area ever be developed into a shopping center, there would be enough room for 10 major department stores, and about 200 smaller businesses, it has been
