**Proposed New Restaurant Plans Polynesian Setting**

Within recent years civilization has rediscovered the romance of the South Sea islands. Within a few months the romantic atmosphere of those islands may drift right into the city of Torrance in the form of an exotic restaurant made up in an authentic South Sea style.

Request to establish such a restaurant at 3901 Pacific Coast highway (northwest corner of the highway and Ocean ave.) is being made presently before the City Council.

The description of the restaurant, to be known as the Polynesian restaurant, reads like a chapter out of Michener's or Melville's South Sea tales.

The main building will be of simulated thatch design with peaked gables to give it a touch

of the Orient. Judicious placement of tikis (pagan god statues), giant man-eating clamshells, a waterfall, and broad-leaved plantings will adorn the entrance way.

The interior will suggest a Samoan meeting-house, with profuse use of bamboo, rattan, tapa and tropical plantings. Native Polynesian music will be played by a Hawaiian string trio.

The dining room, which will feature a periodical rain-on-the-roof spectacle—will accommodate about 100 patrons, with a peak capacity of 160 patrons.

There will also be an outdoor dining area. Among other uses, it will be used for luau on Saturdays and Sundays.

Dinner selections will include Oriental appetizers, authentic Hawaiian and Tahitian dishes, as well as an assortment of Cantonese specialties and East Indian curries and sates.

Women employes (washines) will be attired in fitted flower-print dresses that nearly touch the floor (holimuus). They will be wearing island slippers (tabes).

The men (kanes) will wear long-sleeved aloha shirts and white linen slacks and white shoes.

The restaurant will comprise about 6000 square feet of area under roof; 12,000 square feet of outdoor dining area; and about 20,000 square feet of parking area to accommodate about 100 cars. The entire property amounts to about 1 1/2 acres.

**Directors**

Directors and officers of the restaurant include: L. P. Reitz, Jr., matre d'hotel, president and director; Richard C. Meyers, vice-president and director; Paul E. Paine, secretary, treasurer and director.

Reitz has worked as senior staff engineer for Hughes Aircraft in Los Angeles. He has toured Europe as a musician and has studied Polynesian music.

Meyers has been associated with Van de Kamp's, and was head dinner chef for the chain of Bob's Drive-In restaurants. He has created art objects in ceramics and has been associated with Technicolor, Inc. and Consolidated Film Industries, having contributed much to the field of color control for motion pictures.

Paine spent three years in the South Pacific, gaining extensive knowledge of the South Seas. He and Meyers have made a great study of the foods of the Hawaiian Islands and

**Union Carbide To Build Plant**

Plans for the construction of an ethylene glycol plant in Puerto Rico to cost about \$28.5 million were announced today by Morse G. Dial, President of Union Carbide and Carbon Corporation. It is contemplated that the new plant will be constructed, owned, and operated by Union Carbide Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Union Carbide. An application for tax exemption under Puerto Rico's Industrial Incentive Act has been filed by Union Carbide Carbide, Incorporated. Completion of the plant is scheduled to be about two years after the grant of the tax exemption.

**County Plans To Straighten Boundaries**

As a means of eliminating confusion and inconvenience to the public caused by isolated unincorporated strips of highways within city areas, the county has opened negotiations with several cities in the Second district for annexation of these strips. Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported this week.

Under a law adopted by the State Legislature in 1955 the board of supervisors may annex a highway strip of unincorporated land to an adjacent city when the highway is bounded on both sides by city areas.

"This will certainly help to clear up the jurisdictional tangle caused by these isolated county strips. Primary purpose of any such annexation would be to provide better service in the event of an auto wreck, a fire, or similar emergency," Supervisor Hahn declared.

When the unincorporated strip is located between two cities, it can only be annexed to one city or the other; the strip can not be split, because that would not simplify the problem.

The county is proposing that the annexations be worked out on a cooperative basis with the cities involved.

Supervisor Hahn said that the following annexation has been proposed in his district:

Gramercy place, between 166th street and 174th street, and 174th street between Gramercy and Western avenue, and Western avenue between 174th street and 182nd street forms a narrow band of unincorporated territory separating Gardena, on the east and Torrance on the west.
