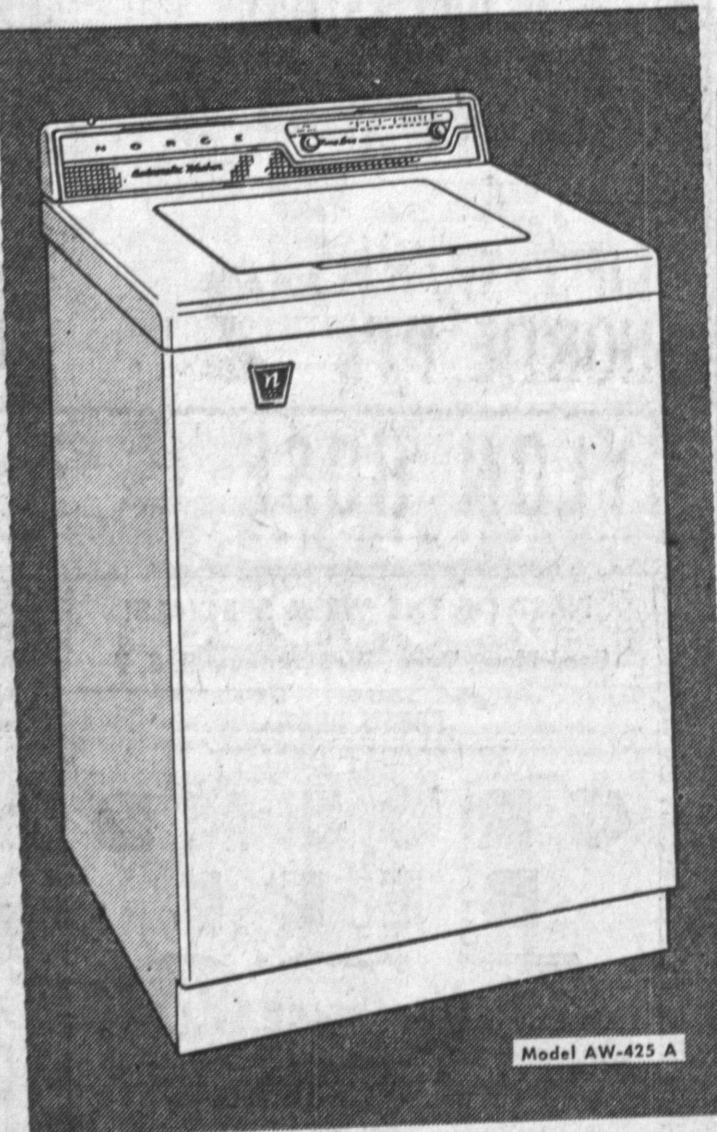

After the happy fellowship or a group sing, camp was over for the day at 3:30 p.m.

The counselors encouraged the girls to work together, as well as to develop an interest in individual activities. In the relaxed and unhurried atmosphere of the day camp, the girls found a welcome contrast to the usual pressure of school and other activities.

The Harbor District Day Camp is a part of the overall day camp program sponsored each year by the Los Angeles Area Council Camp Fire Girls. This year, over 1900 girls will take part in the 18 day camps being held throughout the Los Angeles area. Funds provided to the Camp Fire Girls by the Community Chest have made the Day Camp program possible.
