

The other 20 per cent includes welded pipe and electrical conduit for general industrial use and construction, and industrial jobs handled on a contract basis.

Spalding is works manmanufactures oil field machinery and equipment and also gets a healthy volume of special machinery orders and heavy fabrication jobs for various West Coast industries. The company's other plants are at Gainesville and Houston, Texas, for production equipment; Toledo, Ohio, for small drilling rigs; and Ambridge and Etna, Pa., for tubular products.
