LOMITA SPEAKER MAKES ILLOGICAL CHARGES

We are glad that Mr. Lou A. Gretz who warned Lomita residents Tuesday of the dangers of incorporation and annexation loves a good scrap.

Because, frankly, he's asking for it. It's been a long time since we've had the pleasure

to hear anyone make so many incredible remarks for the record at a public meeting. Mr. Gretz' three-pronged attack against incorporation or annexation were based on the claims that local

government is 1) not to be trusted, 2) undesirable, and The speaker painted some very sinister pictures about the terror and corruption of local politics. He

hinted darkly at politicians who would enslave citizens and bleed them dry with taxes. On the other hand, he talked in glowing and exalted

terms of county government. Politics being politics, it is surprising that Mr. Gretz could have such a low opinion of one level of government and such a high opinion of another level.

Nor does his faith in government by rem

trol stand up too well. If local government were such a terrible thing, then there wouldn't be so many communities having their own government. In fact, we would all be clamoring

to be controlled only by the federal government, eliminat ing every level of government that stands between us and Washington, D. C. If absentee government is so ideal, the original 13

colonies wouldn't have thought of bolting against England. But they did - and they seemed to have had pretty good reasons.

Mr. Gretz claimed that incorporation or annexation would be a costly matter.

This is a very important point and we were hoping that he would enlighten us on this matter. But he didn't, except in very vague and sweeping terms.

The case for incorporation has been presented. The case for annexation or for remaining unincorporated must still be presented clearly.

Until this is done, no one can judge these issues

Residents Warned of Change

Scrappy Lou A. Gretz told Lomita residents Tuesday night in no uncertain terms that incorporation would be dangerous, undesirable, and expensive and that they would regret such a move for the rest of their

Gretz, representing the California League of Unincorporated Communities, spoke to about 200 residents who attended a public meeting sponsored by the Citizens Committee Opposing Incorporation of

At one point of the meeting during the question and answer period, Gretz was asked if Lomita residents would not be considered unprogressive if they failed to incorporate.

"I'm the most unprogressive individual you've ever met," he replied. "And I'm proud of it. You're unprogressive—and keep it that

Gretz described himself as the ecretary of the South-East Inustrial Area Association of East Los Angeles, "the largest unincorporated area by population (125,000) in the entire U.S. and the most highly concentrated industrial area in Southern California."

"I am also a lobbyist, and very proud of it," he added.

Likes a Scrap

"When you defend a cause such as unincorporation," he be-"with so many so-called experts and self-seeking individuals trying to perpetuate themselves into some kind of political office, you get pushed row. I like it. I'm used to it. I like a good scrap."

He said that there was no problem faced by an unincorporated community such as Lomita that it couldn't solve itself, without resorting to "another layer of government,"

He warned residents not "to swallow" statements allegedly poration that there is a law whereby Lomita must decide on either annexation or incorporation. He said there was no such law.

Suspicious

Casting suspicion on local government he challenged resiients to "go into the city council of anyone of the 49 cities in Los Angeles county or read the minutes and see how few people get so much done for themselves and not for individuals such as you and I."


Lomita residents can get anyhing they want without forming their own government, he maintained.


