Just as we thought that Flying Saucers had faded out of sight to make room for Elvis (the Pelvis) Presley, one of those confounded UFOs zoomed into view again.

This time it hovered a little bit too close to home for comfort or ridicule.

The local residents who saw "The Thing" just aren't the type to go around spinning space yarns.

In the past, it's always been possible to start a good hot saucer argument to break up the boredom, knowing that nobody could possibly put an end to it, and spoil the fun. Not so any more, it seems.

It's hard to continue arguing after hearing the sober testimony of 15 soldiers all of whom saw the same thing.

Guard unit. Their convoy was just returning from summer maneuvers.

Among those who observed the Unidentified Flying Object was Captain Douglas J. Horlander, commanding officer of the local unit (Company E, 132nd Armored Engineer Battalion, 40th Division).

Captain Horlander is a World War II veteran, having seen action in both theaters of war, including 11 countries. He was in the service 43 months, serving with the 361st Engineer (SS) Regiment.

This is his account of the Flying Saucer episode: "I took a 24-man detail and left Camp Roberts one day ahead of the troops. It was Friday, August 23, 6:10 p.m. "Our convoy was just about six miles north of Santa Barbara at Goleta. We were going along at 25 m.p.h.

There It Was "I was sitting in the front seat of the jeep, half asleep.

M/Sgt. William Lyons was riding in the rear. Suddenly Lyons tapped me on the shoulder.

" 'Hey, Cap,' he said. 'I've been watching this thing.' "I looked up, and there I saw this round object standing perfectly still, at about a 1000 ft. elevation. It was round and shiny like the top of a tin can. It looked like the sun, only the sun was coming from another direction.

"First I thought it was a blimp. It was at a 45 degree angle from us, toward the left. All at once it zoomed sideways and then instantly up to about 5000 ft. at a right angle, like the beam of a flashlight.

"Then I thought that it might be a weather balloon," Horlander continued. "But suddenly it came down again to a 2000 ft. elevation.
