tion-wise.

II.—RECOMMENDATION SUMMARIZED

1. Incorporation is desirable and practical. It would result in lower tax rate, improved facilities and local control over local problems. The contract system for certain municipal services is advisable.

III.—GENERAL REASONS FOR INCORPORATION

1. The trend is towards incorporation. County government cannot keep pace with the purely local demands of growing communities. Supervisor Herbert C. Legg recommends it, even.

2. Annexation is swallowing up unincorporated areas.

3. Unincorporated areas are not benefiting directly from the new one per cent sales tax. The money goes to the county.

IV.—NO PROPERTY TAX NECESSARY

1. Revenue from the new sales tax is frequently so lucrative that some cities do not need property tax. Lomita will receive at least \$112,000 and possibly more from the tax. No property tax is needed.

V.—WHY CITIES INCORPORATE

1. In order to a) gain control of large state revenues which otherwise go to the county; b) to try to reduce the tax rate; and c) to reap the benefits of local self-government.

2. Benefits of local control include the better and faster solution of such problems as: traffic patrol, traffic safety, curbs, gutters and paving, local park planning, control over zoning.

VI.—REVENUE AVAILABLE TO LOMITA

1. Estimate income in first full year—\$292,640 (not including income from any local property tax).

VII.—EXPENDITURES

1. Street construction — \$40,000.
2. Street maintenance — \$15,000.
3. Policing activities—\$90,000.
4. Fire Department (remain in district).
5. Administrative staff — \$33,800.
6. City Hall operation—\$6000.
7. Street lighting—\$18,000.
8. General contracts — \$8500 (other than listed).
9. City Council expenses—\$2400 (no salaries).
10. Park development and maintenance—\$25,000.
11. Miscellaneous—\$10,000.
12. Total—\$248,700.

VIII.—UNAPPROPRIATED RESERVE

1. Money left over—\$43,940.

IX.—TAXES

1. Before incorporation—total, \$6,6123.
2. After incorporation—total, \$6,3885.
3. Total saving by incorporation—total \$0,2238.

Sisters who will build a new 125-bed hospital close to all of us, and when there is private interest such as this to assure the highest type of hospitalization, there is no need at this time for the district hospital."

Harry Nicholls, president of the Manhattan Beach Kiwanis Club, urged that the story of the voluntary hospital be presented at the earliest possible date before all service clubs in the beach area.

"It seems only fair that the clubs have accurate and complete information concerning the tax-free hospital before they vote to tax themselves further," he declared.

Impartial

Mrs. Eunice Patterson, chairman of the women's division of the Redondo Beach Chamber of Commerce, told the gathering she has maintained, and will continue to maintain an impartial position regarding the Catholic hospital.

"I feel as Mr. Nicholls does, however," she stated, "in the belief that everyone should know both sides of the picture before the matter is brought before the voters."

Others attending the meeting were Mrs. Alice Madden of Redondo Beach; Dr. Gerald M. Eastham, of the medical staff of Torrance Memorial hospital; George W. Post, of the Torrance branch of the California bank; and representatives of the cam-

aign headquarters staff for the \$766,000 fund-drive for the voluntary hospital.

Dr. Ewens said complete details of the Thursday meeting will be announced early next week, and pointed out that at that time complete information concerning the Little Company of Mary project will be available at an information office to be located at 2418B Redondo Beach boulevard.
