While the council couched this idea in such honey-toned phrases as "bonds," "consent NO. 22 judgment," "reasonable dili-

gence," and "reasonable means" -it meant only one thing, namely, that the hog ranches must go at the end of six months.

Of Torrance's estimated 82,000 residents, few are probably aware of the fact that there are a couple of hog ranches smack in the middle of town.

Not only are there hundreds of porkers making their residence locally, but they are oinking around languidly right in back of the new civic center on Torrance blvd. and Madrona.

Of course the hogs were there first-long before the council or the residents moved in. And of course thereby hangs the tale. But about two years ago the council gave the hog ranchers an ultimatum - the hogs must go by October 1, 1956. That's what the ordinance said.

Recognizing the hand-writing on the hog pens, the ranchers started looking around for wider and more open spaces.




