**County Fair All Set For Gala Opening**

Under the banner "A Pageant of Progress," the 29th annual Los Angeles County Fair was poised today on the threshold of its gala premier at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. Culminating a year of intensive planning and preparation, the multi-million dollar exposition is geared to greet well over a million visitors before it closes at midnight, September 30.

Likened to a mighty show window, the 450-acre park with its 200 permanent buildings, dramatizes agricultural, industrial and cultural achievement in literally miles of exhibits and displays of infinite variety and appeal. From Siskiyou on the north to San Diego in the south, more than a hundred counties and communities vie with one another in combining artistry with utility in magnificent creations to set forth their county.

Because of its magnitude and ramifications, the fair is divided into twenty major divisions, each a creditable show in itself. One can gain an idea of its diversity from a quick glance at the major classifications.

Agriculture and horticulture presents man's mastery over nature in prize products of orchard, field and garden. A glorious symphony of color greets the eye in the magnificent floral building. The cream of the flocks and herds are in the livestock show.

**CONGRESS PRAISED BY KING**

The Democratic 84th Congress was the most productive in history, passing more bills than any other Congress, states Congressman Cecil R. King in his regular "Your Congressman Reports" sent to the people of the 174th District.

In the eight-page report King hails the accomplishments of the session as "a constructive, substantial record of achievement."

King details his major accomplishments in the 84th Congress as: enactment of Social Security amendments, lowering of eligibility age for women, lower age for disability payments and increase in payments to the blind, disabled and aged; measures which strengthened enforcement of Federal narcotic laws; passage of his legislation referred to as the model workman's compensation bill; and numerous measures in behalf of the fishing industry, schools, veterans affairs, small business, shipping, harbors, natural resources and postal and federal workers.
