

## DR. PHILLIS WRIGHT NAMED AMONG "WOMEN OF TOMORROW"

Dr. Phillis M. Wright, Harbor General hospital associate professor of Pediatrics Division, will be among the Women of Tomorrow, named by the Women's Committee of the Welfare Federation of Los Angeles area during the 15th annual Gold Key breakfast Monday, October 1, at the Hollywood Palladium.

The Women of Tomorrow will be cited for their work in their own fields and for the contribution they are making to community life and betterment through their professions.

Dr. Wright, UCLA head physician at Harbor General hospital, is a graduate honor student of Barnard college; Phi Beta Kappa, and research associate in endocrinology, University of Rochester. In 1950 she

was sent to Japan as pediatrician in the Atomic Bomb Casualty Commission of the National Research Council to study long term effects on children of exposure to atomic bombing.

Also selected for citation in their field of endeavor are: Law, Mrs. Marvin Gross, Los Angeles, Deputy Attorney General; alumna of UCLA Law School and San Diego State, and member of the State and American Bar Associations.

Also selected for citation were outstanding women in the Los Angeles area in the fields of law, business, art, journalism, drama, public health, social work, education, scientific research, and music.

Highlight of the breakfast rally will be the presentation of the Gold Key award to the outstanding Woman of the Year, whose name is kept in confidence until the presentation award.
