ral services to 23 communities in the Harbor-Torrance-South Bay areas.

While \$31 has been donated from the San Pedro, Lomita, Torrance and Redondo areas, an additional \$119 is required to meet the total \$150 required for installation of more phones at the clinic.

"Without these extra phones, it will be impossible to provide adequate service for the professional staff who will be here at the clinic on a five day a week schedule instead of the present one day a week." Mrs. L. K. Walsworth, coordinator, explained.

Donations should be sent to the Harbor District Mental Health Service, 731 S. Beacon Street, San Pedro. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the clinic at TErminal 2-6464.

Response to a previous appeal was made by the Lomita Presbyterian Church Mothers' Club-13 members donating \$5; 15 members of the Seaside Hi-Liters, a mother's group from Seaside Heights in the Torrance-Redondo area donated \$25; an individual contribution of \$1 was mailed to the Harbor District Mental Health Service.

Included among the 23 communities served by the clinic, in addition to Torrance are Lomita, Dominguez, Harbor City, and Keystone.

The board of directors, who donate their time and services, asks individuals and organizations in the cities served by the clinic to help meet the \$119 still needed.

While the communities will be informed when the quota is reached, any possible surplus will go toward meeting the year's budget of \$5,000. This July '56 through June '57 budget pledged is the communities' responsibility in maintaining the clinical service.

The additional full time professonal staff has been made possible through funds voted by the State legislature.
