

DRUIDS DO IT . . . BUT HENRY DIDN'T

All Hallow's Eve, or Hallowe'en as it is more commonly called, originated with the ancient Druids of Ireland who believed that spirits of the dead would wander abroad on the evening before All Soul's Day, November 1. So beware of wandering

On this fateful evening the Irish would go from house to house collecting breadcake, butter, cheese and eggs for the feast of Saman.

Hence the modern practice of trick or treating so prevalent among the young set. Our modern day merrymakers, however, will probably have something a little sweeter in mind when they approach local home owners.

Trick Or Treat

The sixteenth century English were perhaps a little more up to date in this matter. They would go from parish to parish begging and singing for "soul cakes or any good thing to make them merry." ,The merrymaking sometimes got out of hand, as it does today, and King Henry VIII was forced to abolish all superstitious practices such as bell ringing despite protests that the wandering spirits would be offended.

Fortune telling was one of the more exciting and suspenseful parts of ancient Hallowe'en rites. Whereas today we tell fortunes by looking into a crystal ball or a deck of cards, boys and girls at one time told fortune from apple seeds, cabbages and hazel nuts.

Cat Haters Beware

Even the much-abused cat will have his day. That screaching, ominous creature perched on the proverbial witch's broom can change the course of life on Hallowe'en. If it sits quietly beside a person, although the association may be unpleasant to some, peace and prosperity are indicated. A sudden jump into somebody's lap is nothing to scream hysterically about. According to superstition, opportunity awaits. But if this felined creature runs in the opposite direction, good luck has also vanished and a secret will be divulged within a week.
