## Local Area Moves Into Third Place

This assembly district, Tuesday, Nov. 6, with the re-election of Vincent Thomas; (D-San Pedro), and the defeat of Thomas Maloney, (R-San Francisco), became the third most important of the 80 in the state, according to Thomas' campaign headquarters.

Maloney, dean of the legisla ture, will end his legislative career this year after 32 years continuous service, and as the result, the 20th district will crop in classification from first to last while the 68th district will move up from fourth to third due to Thomas' re-election. The latter next January will begin his ninth two-year term. Thomas first was elected in 1940

In winning re-election this year Assemblyman Thomas rolled up his largest vote, approximately 54,000. He defeated his Republican opponent by 35,000, according to unofficial abulations.
