Festivities will kick off at El Prado and Sartori.

The general hoopla leading up to the noon celebration will start at 8 this morning with the installation of 45"x28" posters on all light standards and telephone poles. The redwhite-and-blue posters will read: "Torrance, All-America City award winner."

In addition, 30,000 windshield stickers of the same pattern will be disributed as well as 3,000 decals for use on city equipment, business doors and windows. School children will receive buttons and badges.

CARRYING DISCOUNT RACKET TOO FAR

(Editor's note: The following editorial is reproduced from the "Southern California Teamster," official organ Joint Council Teamsters No. 42, Los Angeles, California, December 12, 1956.)

An almost ludicrous situation developed at the monthly Joint Council meeting last Friday night when one union asked that another union's store be placed on the official unfair list.

It isn't funny. It's a travesty on unionism and the goals and principles for which unions were established. The store in question will not sign a union contract for its clerks. In other words it won't pay union wages and. benefits, although the ownership is union.

Not only that, but the store makes it a point to sell non-union beer, non-union products and cheap imports made by foreign slave labor that is in direct competition to American made goods.

We can just imagine what the union in question would say if the Teamsters went into the same industry in which that union has members and opened a plant with non-union labor and then refused those people the right of organization and the going union wages in the industry.

Yet that is exactly what this union is doing. It has opened a retail outlet in direct competition to fair employers who pay union wages.

Fair employers cannot compete with cheap, nonunion retail outlets who refuse to pay union wages. Fair employers cannot stay in business without

making a profit. Yet this union would deny such a basic economic

It's high time that some unions and some union leaders awoke to the fact that they cannot wear two hats simultaneously.

They cannot be a union representative one moment and demand union wages for their members and then turn around and become a proprietor and deny union wages for their employes.

If these unions and union leaders do not recognize such basic facts, then the Teamsters will have to do something about it.

The Teamsters will be forced to take action against such operations because they are not going to stand idly by and see private owners who pay their employes union wages, be driven out of business, especially when it is done by a union!

The Teamsters cannot and will not countenance

The resolution passed by Joint Council delegates unanimously condemned such ridiculous actions.

It further called upon all secretaries to make known the fact to the members and to pursue an active consumer boycott.

And if further action is necessary, it will be taken.
