

Sight Reading Criticized

I am very pleased to be able voice my opinion concerning our youngsters' education today. What I am about to say I speak from experience.

First of all let me say we have lived in Torrance and vicinity for 15 years and have had 5 children at one time, in school. They range in age from 19 years to 8 years.

Our older boy graduated from Narbonne in June '56 and the Maybe I will be thought "old fashioned," but the methods used when I went to school worked then and I believe they will still work. At least we learned how to read, write and spell in the first grade,

Now we have children ready

to enter Junior high which can neither read nor spell.

The first thing I learned was ABC's and then the sound of each letter. After that I was taught how to put two letters together and how they sounded. Most words are spelled by the way they sound.

When I was-older and was taught to spell a tricky word I knew it was a tricky word and for me it became easy to spell. In the first grade I was given a reader to bring home and in the second I had a reader, spell-er and music book.

From the very start I had home work to do every day and it continued all through high school. When our first boy started to school in Torrance I went to school with him one day to see the methods they use in teaching the children.

As everyone knows they are taught to picture read. That may be all right in some cases but not in all. A child is shown a picture of a house with the word house under the picture. Pretty soon the child knows

what a house looks like and he knows what the word "house" looks like but he still does not know how to spell house. Why? Because he has not been taught how to spell the word, he has memorized it.

It is not too hard for a child to learn his nouns in that manner but what about the words such as if, and, why and they. There is not a picture for these words and the child is completely lost.

Speaking of helping our children at home with their home work, how can we help them when they are not allowed to bring home a school book until they are in Junior high?

In the second place I would never be of any help to my children because of the methods used today and because of the way I was taught. Besides that, if the parents have to do the teaching the children might as well stay at home.

When my daughter was 9 years old she was ill and had to stay home from school for wite some time. She had a ome teacher for several weeks. I tried to help her with her reading and spelling but did not get very far.

When I gave her a word to spell I told her to listen to the way the word sounded.

She was completely lost because she had not been taught by sound

I asked her one day if she ven knew her ABC's and she said she did not.
