ments on the question of the Gulf of Eilath (Aqaba)," he wrote, "a question which represents a challenge to all free-thinking nations who believe in free commerce everywhere."

"incidentally," he continued in his letter to Revell "this is a subject which should be close to your heart if only for the fact that it is connected with a pipeline, the pipes for which are being produced in the plant supplied by you."

The gulf of Aqaba runs roughly parallel to the Suez canal, Naveh points out. Until November, 1956, six Egyptian gun emplacements prevented free navigation.

"(Then) Israel liberated the islands (guarding the gulf) and put an end to a most flagrant abuse of the world's basic principle that all straits and waterways are to be free and open for navigation to ships of all nations." Naveh said.

Because the Suez canal is vulnerable and narrow, the Gulf of Aqaba could serve as a vital waterway in a similar capacity.

"The most important point is that the mere existence of such a line of communication," he concludes, "would break the Egyptian monopoly. It would free
