#### EDITORIAL

#### Freedom From Promoters

Bond issues are often complicated. And because they are citizens often vote against them, even though the issues may be very important.

One reason why bond issues fail is because voters fre-

quently do not understand them properly. To solve this problem, a firm-J. B. Hanauer & co.has approached the City Council offering its services as

"financial consultants." Part of the firm's job would be to promote bond issues which the City Council has voted to place on the ballot.

The firm would be paid anywhere from three-fourths of one per cent to one and three-fourths per cent of the total

We believe that such a policy is not only fundamentally wrong, but dangerous.

bond issue.

The City Council-a political body-does not have the right to hire individuals to promote issues which are fundamentally political.

This right is reserved strictly to citizen groups desiring either the success or defeat of the civic and political issues

An agency, hired by the city, would necessarily defend the view of its employer.

Not only would the money at the agency's disposal place opposition forces at a disadvantage, but democratic government would be placed in jeopardy when the majority opinion of a political body can hire promoters whose financial power could virtually silence opposition.

We agree that the public has the right to be properly informed regarding political issues. That is the duty of a free, competitive press.

But the merits of an efficient promotion agency working for a political body such as the city are far outweighed by the potential evils.

Democracy, even when it stumbles and bungles, is safer in the long run than political efficiency which tends to become dictatorial and ultimately tyrannical.
